IN APPEALING TO RELIGIOUS VOTERS, DEMS ARE PEW-LESS

With the predictability of a John McCain temper tantrum (or a John Edwards \$200-haircut), every two year the Democrats announce that they're going to fight like hell for the religious vote – a vow duly reported by the media in the hushed tones of revelation.

Thus, a story on the recent CNN Democratic presidential forum began with the following observation: "After barring their souls in a live television confessional, top Democratic White House hopefuls have put Republicans on notice that religious voters are up for grabs."

At the forum, sponsored by Jim (Hugo-Chavez-Is-My-Shepard) Wallis and his Sojourners collective, Hillary Clinton, Barack Obama and John Edwards all did passable impressions of Billy Graham. (Al Gore was off worshipping a tree and praying to the Earth Goddess to smite fossil fuels.)

Hillary confessed that but for her faith, she might not have pulled through the dark night of the soul when she learned that her hubby (notorious for his sexual escapades) was doing some Biblical knowing with a White House intern.

"I am my brother's keeper," Obama proclaimed, adding in gender-correct fashion, "I am my sister's keeper." Given enough time, the Illinois Senator, who's nominated himself for sainthood, probably would have gotten around to his aunts and uncles, second-cousins once removed and every Democratic primary voter in Iowa and New Hampshire.

Edwards expressed his absolute conviction that "The hand of God today is in every step of what happens with me and every human being that exists on this planet." God is my hair-stylist? God is my booking agent? Edwards recently received \$50,000 for telling a college audience how to fight poverty. A good thing for him that the poor will always be with us.

Dems' God talk isn't limited to the campaign trail.

Speaking in support of increased federal funding for embryonic stem-cell research – House Speaker Nancy Pelosi sermonized: "Science is a gift of God to all of us, and science has taken us to a place that is *biblical* in its power to cure... And that is embryonic stem cell research."

Embryonic stem-cell research involves destroying human embryos in a search for cures. Pelosi is saying that the destruction of God-given life is a gift from God. Would that make Dr. Josef Mengele, Auschwitz's notorious Angel of Death, a miracle-worker in Pelosi's eyes?

Don't try to make sense of any of this. The Democrats' doctors-of-spin have told them to talk God. Whatever drivel they're selling (including themselves), try to justify it in spiritual terms.

The pursuit of religious voters has becomes the Democrats' quest for the Holy Grail. Increasingly, it resembles the Monty Python version of same.

Values voters are believed to have swung the 2004 election from John Kerry (AKA: The Altar Boy) to George W. Bush. The president got 61% of those who attend religious services weekly, as well as 78% of evangelicals. Running against the first Catholic

nominee since John F. Kennedy, W. received the support of 52% of Catholics.

According to the latest Gallup poll, when asked to rate the state of moral values in America, just 1% said they were excellent, 16% said "good," and 44% rated the nation's moral health "poor." Moreover, 8 in 10 Americans think morality has declined in the past three years. They are not talking about the "lack of affordable health care," but the products of the Democrats favorite industries – Hollywood, the courts and public education.

Democrats are to traditional religion what Islam is to tolerance.

But, with typical elitist arrogance, the Party of Perjury thinks it has only to go through the motions – bow their heads collectively and mumble meaningless pieties — to make the faithful believe Hillary and Company could walk on water and turn Kool-Aid into wine.

When it comes to walking the walk – they can't even crawl. Some of them can't even talk the talk. In 2004, Rep. Jim McDermott (Democrat, Washington State) was asked to lead the Pledge of Allegiance at an opening session of the House.

In doing so, McDermott intentionally omitted the words "one nation under God." Baghdad Jim (part of Saddam's Congressional auxiliary, prior to the Iraq war) explained that due to a federal appeals court decision, he didn't know if God was still constitutional.

McDermott's office said the Congressman was "unsure of what to do" because the U.S. 9th. Circuit Court of Appeals said it constituted an establishment of religion for schoolchildren to say the pledge with an acknowledgement of God.

Apparently, McDermott was unaware that: 1) The House of Representatives isn't a public school (although its members often behave like schoolchildren), 2) Washington, D.C. is outside the 9th. Circuit and 3) The 9th. is the most overruled of federal appeals courts – as it was in this case.

No, McDermott was just another liberal Democrat going to absurd lengths to create another God-free zone.

If Democrats are down with the G-man, why is it the federal judges appointed by Democratic presidents insist that: 1) Public displays of the Ten Commandments violate the Establishment Clause, 2) Student-initiated prayer before football games is unconstitutional, 3) Jesus was invoked too often in prayers at opening sessions of the Indiana state legislature, 4) Municipal seals can't reference God, 5) A cross erected as a memorial to the nation's war dead on city property in San Diego had to go, and 6) Creches can only be displayed on public property in the presence of Santas and candy canes.

Democrats may believe in God – but have a humungo problem with the word of God.

You might say the Bible frowns on same-sex relationships, which it calls an "abomination."

When the Federal Marriage Amendment came up in the Senate in 2004, on a procedural vote, 45 Republicans voted for the FMA (which defines marriage as the union of a man and a woman), while 43 Democrats voted against it. In other words, 93% of Senate Democrats voted to turn marriage into unholy matrimony, while 88% of Republicans endorsed Genesis.

Speaking to the Human Rights Campaign (the nation's largest homosexual lobby) in March, after comparing their special-interest pleading to the Civil Rights movement, Senator Clinton told the sodomites assembled that she stood shoulder-to-shoulder with them in their fight to secure their "sacred values," – including gay adoption. As of March 30, the House version of this attack on the First Amendment had 137 co-sponsors – all but 8 of them Democrats. God is my diversity trainer?

To whom do the Dems turn for metaphysical guidance? One usually associates the party with such moral exemplars and spiritual giants as the Rev, Jesse Jackson and the Rev. Al Sharpton.

But these days, the Democrats are more likely to seek soul-power from the Sojourners' Rev. Jim Wallis, sponsor of the aforesaid CNN forum. For the top-tier Democratic hopefuls to appear at forum run by Wallis would be like Republican candidates addressing the John Birch Society.

Usually described in the media as a "peace activist" or an "anti-poverty campaigner," Wallis is an out-of-the-closet Marxist who went from fronting for the Viet Cong in the '60s, to making excuses for Khmer Rouge atrocities and mocking Vietnamese boat people in the 1970s (They had been infected by capitalism, the Rev. jeered, and were fleeing "to support their consumer habit in other lands") to sanctifying Nicaraguan and Salvadoran communists in the '80s, as part of the clerical useful idiots Witnesses for Peace.

Today, he bestows the same loving kindness on Islamic terrorists that he previously reserved for People's Republics. It's not that Democrats aren't religious – rather that they practice a religion alien to both Christianity and Judaism.

Its doctrine includes support for abortion on demand, hate crimes legislation, the Kyoto Treaty, driver's licenses for illegal aliens, multiculturalism and a socialism of property and values. Its priesthood is feminists, environmentalists, gay-activists and radical secularists, presided over by its college of cardinals -- Rosie O'Donnell, Bill Maher, Barbra Streisand and Al Franken.

It calls for atonement for the sins of sexism, homophobia, the religious right, the gun lobby, pharmaceutical companies, big oil, Guantanamo, Halliburton and trans-fatty acids.

Its vision of Kingdom Come looks a lot like San Francisco on a Saturday night.
